Dear Professor Popper:

During the last month I have gone thorugh the exciting experience of studying with care your extraordinary Logic of Scientific Discovery. It has been exciting because (1) I warmly agreed with most of the ideas contained in it, (2) many of them I had thought my own, and (3) I found myself in disagreement with a few but important theses of your work, which will lead me, I hope, to a careful study of them.

My only regret in connection with your book is to have come across it so late in life, and particularly after having written my last two books. I now realize (1) that I have been Popperian avant la lettre in many important points, and (2) that several parts in my books would have been different had I known your book in time. Therefore, you must allow me to state that you had no right whatever in delaying for so many years the English translation of such a basic work.

D. for Ciencia e Investigación. It is written on a rather elementary level and contains a few critical remarks along with a definite and unusual - but, of course, wholly deserved - praise. The editors tell me that it will appear in about two months, but I would not be surprised by some further delay, owing to the financial difficulties of all our scientific journals. Which I have just received, are very kind and stimulating. By now you should have received also a copy of <u>Causality</u>, in which I quarrel with some of your views in the field of the philosophy of history. I am sorry that at the time I wrote it I did not know the <u>Logik der</u> <u>Forschung</u>, so that I was unable to say how much I agree with you in so many fundamental points in the philosophy of science. I make up for this in my review.
